Test Type

The Combined Recruitment Test will consist of **objective-type multiple-choice questions (MCQs)** in pen-and-paper mode.

Maximum Marks

The examination carries a maximum of **300 marks**.

Negative Marking

Negative marking makes accuracy extremely important.

Candidates will face a deduction of **1/3rd (0.33 marks)** for every incorrect answer.

Therefore, avoid guessing answers without considering the available options carefully. Regular mock-test practice can help you understand when to attempt a question and when to move ahead.

Selection Stages

The selection process includes:

1. **Combined Recruitment Test (CRT)**

2. Interview

Candidates should prepare for both stages instead of focusing only on the written examination.

- Vocabulary

- Reading comprehension
- Basic language usage

Regular reading can naturally improve vocabulary and comprehension skills.

Aptitude and Reasoning

The aptitude section may require candidates to work with mathematical operations, quantitative aptitude, and reasoning-based questions.

These topics become easier with regular practice.

Instead of studying them only before the examination, solve a small number of questions every day. This will help improve calculation speed and problem-solving ability.

Educational Administration and Policy

This is an important area for candidates preparing for Principal and Vice-Principal positions.

Candidates should focus on topics such as:

- National Education Policy (NEP) 2020
- Educational measurement
- Evaluation
- Education administration
- School-level policies and practices

Candidates should understand modern teaching-learning methods and basic educational principles.

Try to connect these concepts with real classroom situations. This can make difficult concepts easier to remember.
